GGP User Guide Survey

Harmonized Histories Data Release



Thanks to the efforts of **Claudius Garten** (German Federal Institute of Population Research) **new files have been added to the Harmonized Histories dataset: Argentina (Buenos Aires), Taiwan, France, Hong Kong and the Netherlands.**

The new Harmonized Histories dataset now includes **GGG-II data collected from 2022 to 2025. Argentina (Buenos Aires) has a sample size of 2,393** (1,394 women, 992 men and 7 who answered other). **Taiwan has a sample size of 7,718. France has a sample size of 14,285. Hong Kong has a sample size of 4,551. The Netherlands has a sample size of 8,078.**

Two minor updates are also part of the new Harmonized Histories dataset: the availability of Variable ETHNOS for GGS-II data from Estonia and the removal of duplicated observations in the GGS-II data from Czechia.

The Harmonized Histories dataset is an international comparative dataset that focuses on **fertility and partnership histories**. It also captures information on socioeconomic status, place of residence, childhood family, and other relevant demographics. The fertility and partnership biographies are available in a **standardized and user-friendly data format**. By now this dataset covers a wide range of **31 countries and territories around the globe and captures information of over 500,000 individuals in total**.

New Training Resources: Event History Analysis with Harmonized Histories

We're pleased to share that new training materials developed by **Dr Bernice Kuang** (University of Southampton) are now available on the **National Centre for Research Methods (NCRM)** website, offering a practical introduction to **event history analysis** using Harmonized Histories and GGS data.

The training materials include:

- [A guided tour](#) of the UK GGS and how it is transformed into the Harmonized Histories, and information on where to find and download this data
- A [practical tutorial](#) on how to **conduct an event history analysis** using STATA, demonstrating both **non-parametric** and **parametric** event history models, including:

- Step-by-step guidance on **defining risk periods**
- **STATA** commands to **plot survival time data**
- How to apply the **Kaplan-Meier** approach and cumulative hazard plots to visualize differences in timing across groups
- A [practical tutorial](#) to competing risks models, demonstrating:
 - How to prepare data for event history analysis with a **competing risks framework** (where more than one outcome may occur)
 - How to restructure the dataset into a **person-year format**
 - How to then apply **multinomial logistic regression** to conduct discrete-time hazard modelling

These are provided in **video** format with downloadable **slides**, **transcripts**, and **worksheets**, and suggested further reading is also provided for those looking to explore the method in more depth.

European Parenting Leave Policies Dataset



Tracking parenting leave policies in Europe over five decades

We are pleased to share that the **European Parenting Leave Policies (EPLP) Dataset** is now available, providing data on maternity, co-parent, paid parental, and job-protected leave regulations across **21 European countries** from 1970 to 2024. It covers **33 variables** on leave duration, benefits, flexibility, and incentives for sharing leave between couples. The dataset is a great quantitative source for analyzing policy trends, cross-national differences, and the effects of major reforms.

Consortium meeting in Milan

GGP played an active role in the recent Infra4NextGen consortium meeting in Milan, represented by Yuri Pettinicchi and Yuliya Kazakova. The project is coordinated by ESS ERIC and brings together leading European research infrastructures, with GGP as a core partner alongside CESSDA ERIC and EVS.



During the two-day meeting, work package leaders presented progress, shared new findings and results, and demonstrated newly developed tools that strengthen cross-national social science research.

One highlight is the searchable inventory of over **11,000 survey questions**, drawing on major cross-national studies such as **GGP, ESS, EVS, ISSP, EQLS, and Eurobarometer**: Check out the Infra4NextGen tool [here](#)

Fieldwork

Wave 1 (Baseline): Latvia has started their data collection phase, while we are working on setting up multiple other countries! One example is Switzerland, which will employ an Italian, a French, and a German version of GGS wave 1.

Wave 2 (Follow-up): The Argentinian team finalized their Wave 2 pilot in Buenos Aires in early December. We are also currently preparing Wave 2 for the Netherlands.

Data Processing

Stay tuned for the soon-to-be-released Czechia Wave 2 dataset. Iceland Wave 1 will be next in the pipeline, they completed the fieldwork phase last December with a three-language survey!
