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[GGP Lithuania Kick Off](#)



On April 16 in Vilnius, the successful launch of the GGS in Lithuania was celebrated with an engaging conference focused on data-driven decisions for the future of fertility and families.

GGP LT brings together [VDU V. Kavolio institutas / VMU V. Kavolis Institute](#), [Lietuvos socialinių mokslų centras](#), [State Data Agency \(Statistics Lithuania\)](#), and [Vyriausybės strateginės analizės centras \(STRATA\)](#) to collect high quality, internationally comparable longitudinal survey data to better understand demographic change and individual behaviours in family formation.

The programme highlighted the Generations and Gender Programme (GGP) and the

implementation of the Fertility and Family Survey in Lithuania. Experts from Lithuania, the Netherlands, and Poland shared how robust demographic data can help governments better understand family trends and design informed public policies.

Representing the GGP Central Coordination Team, Yuri Pettinicchi presented an overview of the programme, helping the audience place Lithuania's developments within the wider international context.

A big thank you to the organisers for a thoughtful and well-executed event, and to all participants for the lively discussions and shared commitment to advancing demographic research.



GGP Essentials

Intention to migrate among young adults



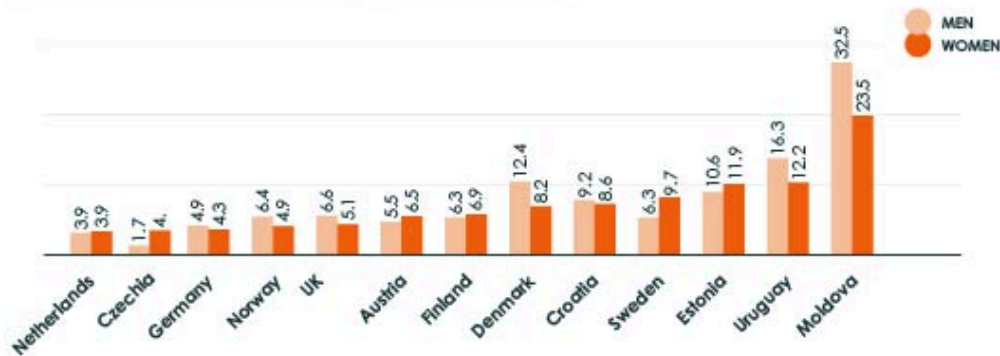
We assess the percentage of young people intending to move to another country within the next 3 years using the Generations and Gender Survey (GGS) data collected from 2020-2024.

DATA ON OVER 45,000 RESPONDENTS AGED 18-34

Respondents were asked if they **intend to move to another country within the next 3 years**. The percentage of people definitely or probably intending to move abroad ranges from under 3% in Czechia to over 28% in Moldova, indicating **large cross-country differences** in emigration plans.

In Moldova, 32.5% of men plan to move abroad, exceeding women's 23.5%. Denmark also shows a gap favouring men (12.4% vs. 8.2%), and **men likewise report higher intentions** in Norway and the UK. In contrast, Czechia (1.7% vs. 4.1%) and Sweden (6.3% vs. 9.7%) both exhibit higher rates for women, while Austria and Finland show a small difference, but still **higher intentions among women**.

How many young adults intend to move abroad in the next three years?

Spring is a season of change - a time when many start thinking about new opportunities, fresh starts, and perhaps even leaving the nest as part of the transition to adulthood.

But how many young adults are actually planning to move outside of their home country? And how do these intentions differ across countries, or between men and women?

The Generations and Gender Survey (GGS) offers a unique opportunity to explore these questions from a cross-national and longitudinal perspective.

Drawing from over 45,000 respondents (aged 18–34) across 13 countries (2020–2024), the data shows that:

- Moldova stands out with the highest emigration intentions, particularly among men (32.5% vs. 23.5% for women)
- The Netherlands sits on the lower end, with around 4% expressing intentions to emigrate
- In countries like Denmark, Norway, and the UK, men are more likely to want to move abroad
- In contrast, women report higher migration intentions in Czechia and Sweden

These findings highlight how migration aspirations can be shaped by gender dynamics situated within particular national contexts.

The first SoGreen data is released!

The first **CRONOS-3 wave** fielded within the **SoGreen project** is now available via the European Social Survey (ESS) [Data Portal](#). Wave 6 of the self-completion panel survey was carried out in **October and November 2025** in **11 countries**: Austria, Belgium, Czechia, Finland, France, Hungary, Iceland, Poland, Portugal, Slovenia, and the United Kingdom.

Around half of the questions in this wave focused on the **green transition, climate change, and the environment**. The new **SoGreen module** includes questions on climate concern, personal responsibility, access to green spaces, air pollution, public transport, energy-efficient household appliances, trust in government action on climate change, and attitudes towards policy measures. Respondents were also asked about their experiences of **extreme weather events**.

The SoGreen module was developed jointly with **SHARE-ERIC, GGP, and GUIDE**, which will also field related questions in their own surveys. In addition to the green transition content, CRONOS-3 Wave 6 includes items on **security and defence policies mental health, wellbeing, social relationships, and volunteering.**

Fieldwork

Wave 1 (Baseline): Italy, Poland, and Latvia are currently collecting data. Latvia has already reached 6,000 responses. We are also busy preparing the Switzerland data collection, which will start in March and will be conducted in three different languages.

Wave 2 (Follow-up): Multiple countries are preparing their Wave 2 surveys. The Dutch team launched their soft launch this month, receiving more than 200 responses so far out of the first 800 invitations sent. We are also finalizing Croatia which will include the sogreen module!

Data Processing

Minor dataset update for Moldova Wave 2 (1.1 is released). In this minor update, the variable labels were revised for b08fer28_3501.
