

GGS Baseline questionnaire and Covid-19



The GGS Baseline questionnaire already included many questions that are highly relevant in the new Covid-19 context, including work conditions, relationship satisfaction, etc. But the new questionnaire also provides the opportunity for national team to add some country-specific questions including Covid-19. National teams interested in adding such items are encouraged to contact the Central Hub since we have compiled examples of Covid-19 questions. Note however that the space for country-specific questions is limited.

Equality and Wellbeing across Generations - call for proposals



With new survey data being collected in 2020 and 2021, the GGP invites partners to think about transnational collaborations to apply for funding. An excellent opportunity is the recently launched call for proposals for Equality and Wellbeing across Generations (EWG). For this call researchers are invited to submit transnational proposals that explore:

- How demographic change is altering the implicit contract between generations?
- How policy can ensure that change results in a reduction in inequality?

The PhD project is part of the newly funded project "Using machine learning to improve the measurement of the European fertility gap". The overall aim is to improve our understanding of fertility intentions by combining data from openended and close-ended questions from a unique large population-based demographic survey. The innovation will consist in the use of natural language processing and machine learning techniques to analyze the data.
