#### Visiting the GGP Central Hub: A Brazilian testimonial



Victor Leocádio is a PhD Candidate in Demography at the Center for Development and Regional Planning (CEDEPLAR) of the Federal University of Minas Gerais (Brazil). His PhD project is about fertility intentions and gender equity, two topics that are well covered in the Generations and Gender Survey (GGS).

"My University awarded me with a grant to go abroad to work on my PhD for 6 months. Since I was already working with GGS data, I decided to contact the GGP Central hub to arrange a research visit to the Netherlands Interdisciplinary Demographic Institute (NIDI) in the Hague. In July 2022, I became a guest member of the GGP Central Hub team. Visiting the GGP has been a fruitful experience. I've been given the chance to work with brand new GGS-II data.

Based on these analyses I wrote a paper on fertility together with the director of the GGP, Prof. Dr. Anne Gauthier and colleagues. I also worked on a data quality assessment and was able to observe the complex tasks involved in conducting a cross-country survey. **NIDI** is a welcoming social environment, and the entire **GGP** team is extremely friendly and qualified. I much enjoyed the many interesting discussions, talks, and attending the Dutch Demography Day 2022 conference."

## Revising the GGS follow-up questionnaire: Watch it now!



The fifteenth webinar of the GGP-Connect seminar series was held on the 22nd of November at 13:00 (CEST). On behalf of the GGP Questionnaire Task Force, Monika Mynarska talked about 'Revising the GGS follow-up (wave 2) questionnaire'. In the presentation she outlined the content and revisions for the GGS follow-up (wave 2) questionnaire as proposed by the Questionnaire Task Force.

The Questionnaire Task Force was mandated by the GGP consortium board to revise the existing wave 2 questionnaire, especially to simplify and shorten it to facilitate web-based administering. The follow-up questionnaire is likely to cover about 50% of the baseline questionnaire. This also frees up space for user-suggested questions and modules.

#### Fieldwork update



**Austria** has started Wave 1 of fieldwork early November. The national team sent out 14,000 invitation letters including a 2-euro coin to a simple random sample from the population register. The conditional incentive is a voucher with a value of 20 euro. The survey's main mode is CAWI, but CATI is also offered with the second postal reminder. So far 32% of invitees completed the questionnaire. Soon, a stratified sample will be invited to participate. The stratification is based on the representativeness of the net sample so far. A second stratified sample will follow later. The age range is 18-59.

The Netherlands started the first phase of W1 fieldwork late November. In this first phase (gross N = 2000), two incentive structures will be tested experimentally. In addition, there will be a costs and benefits analysis of sending a third postal reminder versus telephone recruitment for those invitees who did not respond after the second reminder. The second and main phase of the fieldwork is planned for spring 2023. All interviews will be in CAWI mode. The age range is 18-59.

Pilot fieldwork in **Taiwan** started end of October. In total, 2100 invitation letters were sent out, 1260 people were invited by postal mail and the rest is invited by fieldworkers at the door. The mode is CAWI only, including experiments that combine recruitment strategy and different incentives. So far, 11% completed the questionnaire.

Meanwhile, field work operations in the city of Buenos Aires were completed in the last week of November. Fieldwork in Uruguay is scheduled to end mid-December.

The conference will be hybrid, allowing researchers to join us both online or in person in Warsaw. There is no fee for the conference, but places are limited.

The call for abstracts will open in January 2023 and the deadline for abstract submission will be the end of February 2023. Stay tuned to this newsletter for further updates.
