COORDINATE project meeting in Dublin



As the city of Dublin was getting ready for St Patrick's Day, University College Dublin hosted a COORDINATE project meeting on the 14th-15th March. Project partners from 19 institutions met to discuss their progress. **Vytenis Juozas Deimantas** attended the meeting representing the GGP and NIDI.

Partners discussed ideas on how to consolidate the community of researchers interested in child wellbeing and facilitate data access. They also exchanged **insights on how to involve children and youth not only in the data collection, but also in the research design.**

Vytenis Juozas Deimantas reported on 6 non-scientific stakeholder workshops that were held by national trainers in Bulgaria, Lithuania and Moldova. These workshops are a direct results of the train-the-trainer prepared by NIDI in September 2022. More on this workshop can be found <u>here</u>.

Updates from the GGP HUB



Fieldwork updates GGS-II wave 1: Croatia is finalizing fieldwork preparation and will start data collection soon. **The Netherlands** will start the second and largest phase of data collection in the first week of April. Fieldwork in **Hong Kona** is in full swina. The second set of reminders has been sent out. So far. there are 4,047 completed interviews (305 in English and 3,742 in Chinese). The preliminary response rate is around 25%.

The United Kingdom finished fieldwork in February. In total approximately 7,200 interviews have been completed and the response rate based on completed interviews is 14% (taken into account the estimated rate of ineligible addresses in the gross sample). **Austria** has finished fieldwork in March. The total number of completed interviews is 7,712 and the overall response rate based on completed interviews is 35%.

New data release: Czech Republic GGS-II wave 1 is now available. The sample includes 5,583 men and women between the age of 18 to 69. For more detailed information and the codebook visit <u>the GGP website</u>.
